### **From the Rector**

## *Excommunication – a popular Christian sport*

*“...I have no need of thee...” I Corinthians 12*

You need only pick up – you name it – The Telegraph (London), The New Yorker, The San Jose Mercury News – to find that the Episcopal Church and the world wide Anglican Communion are facing a crisis. And if you take only a *prima facie* glance at the usual article, you might go away thinking that the crisis is one of, at most, faith and at least, sex. But that would be simplistic and easy and would allow us to put down the article if we feel that our minds are already made up in one way or another on the issues of sexuality facing society today. No one would deny that there are things about the nature of human sexuality and other issues of what would be called “pastoral theology” – i.e. the way we apply the doctrine of the Faith to the lives of the faithful – that are in question and about which reasonable people hold mutually exclusive differences of opinion. The Christian Church and for that matter the Episcopal Church have had differences of opinion about many things in the past and not just matters of pastoral theology but tooth and nail battles about the very nature of God and issues at the very core of the doctrine of the Faith and have managed in love and Christian charity to live with the differences in the context of ‘communion’. Today we are faced with the opportunity to live with differences.

As Christians we do not have an *option* to be reconciled with each other and live side by side with those with whom we most vehemently disagree. We do not merely have that option, we have that obligation. St. Paul puts it this way in the 12<sup>th</sup> chapter of his first epistle to the Corinthians:

*For the body is not one member, but many. If the foot shall say, Because I am not the hand, I am not of the body; is it therefore not of the body? And if the ear shall say, Because I am not the eye, I am not of the body; is it therefore not of the body? If the whole body were an eye, where were the hearing? If the whole were hearing, where were the smelling? But now hath God set the members every one of them in the body, as it hath pleased him. And if they were all one member, where were the body? But now are they many members, yet but one body. And the eye cannot say unto the hand, I have no need of thee: nor again the head to the feet, I have no need of you.*

Whether or not to consecrate as bishops people in same-sex relationships and whether or not the Church should bless same-sex unions are two questions with which this and every church should struggle and which we should not ignore. But equally, we should not ignore saying in essence, “I have no need of thee”, any with whom we disagree on these or any issues.

We have been part of what became the Anglican Communion today (a federation of 38 self-governing provinces spread across the territory of the former British Empire and beyond) since the American churches formed themselves into the

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Episcopal Church following the American Revolution and defined themselves as churches which are “in communion with the see of Canterbury”. Being “in communion” with the see (diocese) of Canterbury has been a defining feature of all churches of England outside of England which have become independent of the Church in England. What being “in communion” means became clearer when we began to discuss the possibility of being “in communion” with other churches in the 19<sup>th</sup> Century. The Episcopal Church’s General Convention in Chicago in 1886 and the Lambeth Conference in 1888 (a decennial gathering of all Anglican bishops called by the Archbishop of Canterbury) established a “quadrilateral” of non-negotiables including 1) the Holy Scriptures of the Old and New Testament, 2) the Apostles’ and Nicene Creeds, 3) the sacraments of Baptism and Holy Communion, and 4) the Historic Episcopate, locally adapted. It is with these essentials that we have discussed and do discuss Christian unity with other Christian bodies. In 1997 the General Convention in Philadelphia passed the “Concordat” with the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America in which the essentials of the Chicago Lambeth quadrilateral were preserved and just what being “in full communion” would mean, were established.

“Full Communion” with the Lutherans includes among other things 1) being welcome at each other’s communion rail, 2) interchangeability of ministers at the Altar, 3) having common purpose and co-operation in mission and ministry.

Some in the Anglican Communion speak of “impaired communion” existing between different provinces (national churches e.g. “The Church of Uganda” or “The Episcopal Church USA” or “The Anglican Church of Canada”) or between provinces and dioceses (e.g. The Church of Uganda and the Diocese of New Westminster”) or between bishops (e.g. Bishop Duncan and Bishop

Swing). The characteristics of this so-called impaired communion seem to involve one province/diocese/bishop declaring that another province/diocese/bishop is NOT welcome at its/his altar rail or Altar as communicant or celebrant even though they are either both “in communion with the see of Canterbury” or duly ordained ministers in the “One Holy Catholic and Apostolic Church of Christ”. In all of these cases, the “ex-communication” is one-sided. One province/diocese/bishop ex-communicates another province/diocese/bishop and the other does not reciprocate. In other words, one member of the body says to the other “I have no need of thee”.

There is room and always has been room in the Body of Christ for differences of opinion – even on issues of doctrine let alone those of pastoral theology. There is no room for intolerance of those differences. One member of the Body cannot say to another “I have no need of thee”. Christianity is a religion of inclusion not exclusion. Of communion not ex-communication.

May we practice this “doctrine” of communion ecumenically, internationally, nationally, and locally. This brings with it a dual responsibility. 1) Neither asking others to leave the table nor leaving it oneself and 2) Doing everything we can to order our common life to enable others who differ from us to remain at the table. Discerning how to effect both of these is the task which lies in front of us not only as Anglicans and Episcopalians but as members of our local dioceses and parishes. May we take St. Paul’s advice and make our watch phrase: “I have need of thee and thou hast need of me.”

**All Saints' Vestry Meeting Excerpts - 9 May 2006  
(This is not intended to be a report on the meeting)**

**Present:** Sally Cadigan, Katy Dickinson, Diane Frankle, Demian Harvill (Senior Warden), Heather Hadlock (Junior Warden), Carol Hubenthal, Rev. Ian Montgomery (Rector), Jeff Rensch, John Sebes, Mary Walker.

**Rector's Report**

Jeff Rensch asked about the finances mentioned in the writeup for funding the curate position. The Rector noted the options available.

Katy Dickinson asked about the employment situation with the interim Parish administrator. The Rector pointed out that while Jeffrey is working out well, he has been able to make less progress than we envisioned towards documenting and streamlining our office procedures. Thus we may want to extend his contract for additional month(s) in this interim role.

**Discussion on AS Technology**

Mary Walker said she is taking responsibility for finding consultants for both the phone and the computer project; Ian and Jeffrey then need to talk with each consultant.

The Rector asked for feedback on the online Rota calendar that we were experimenting with. People said it wasn't working very well. The Vestry agreed that this particular experiment was a good exercise but we needed to find a better solution.

**Discussion of All Saints Financial Status and Budget, with Consideration of Calling a Curate**

John Sebes presented some PowerPoint slides that showed the original All Saints budget which had a deficit for the year. Then John showed several Pro-forma Budgets for 2006 that reflected different budget scenarios.

John moved that the Vestry authorize the Rector to proceed with the authority to call and hire a Curate to assist with the pastoral, educational, liturgical, and administrative duties of the parish.

**Discussion of Curate Candidates**

Sally Cadigan shared that she and Carol Nash were involved in the initial interviews with two individuals for the Curate position. Ian, Sally and others involved in the initial interviews, are proceeding with having the candidate interview with more people from the parish..

**Questions about Commission Reports**

Katy mentioned that the Outreach Commission is thinking about creating a position of "Events Czarina".

Jeff asked the BUGS Commission if there were any foreseen "potential emergencies" in our physical plant, that might need significant financial investment in 2006-7. Carol said no, that while there were some potential pending projects, there were none that had to be funded immediately.

**Discussion on Hotel de Zink**

Demian Harvill talked about the Adult Education Forum where we did a debriefing on the Hotel de Zink experience. He moved that All Saints host Hotel de Zink in October 2006.. Sally Cadigan seconded. Katy mentioned that the InnVision people were very appreciative of All Saints' involvement with Hotel de Zink.

**Discussion of the Junior Warden Role and Position-Holder**

Heather Hadlock informed the Vestry that she was asking for the Vestry to elect a new Junior Warden. Sally said she was willing to take on the role, but she did have reservations due to family concerns. The Vestry agreed that was a risk for anyone in that position and they would be supportive.

## All Saints' Vestry Meeting Excerpts - June 2006

**Present:** Sally Cadigan (Junior Warden), Diane Frankle, Demian Harvill (Senior Warden), Heather Hadlock, Carol Hubenthal, Rev. Ian Montgomery (Rector), Jeff Rensch, John Sebes, Mary Walker.

### **Diocean Relations: Status**

The Rector attended a Deanery / Diocean DESC meeting where they looked at diocesan structure. There are three structures being discussed. John Sebes asked when any new model would be selected and rolled out. Ian said this the October convention is the timeframe to decide diocesan structure and funding structure.

### **Questions Emerging from the Commission Reports**

Christian Education. Diane Frankle asked for Jeff Rensch's take on how this group is doing. Jeff expressed his concern that we don't have enough children to show up at their events. Sally and others expressed their perception that Adult Ed is doing well.

**BUGS.** Carol Hubenthal is calling various folks to get an expert to evaluate the parish hall roof. The goal is to get any key/basic fixes completed, before the rains begin in the fall / winter. Everybody agreed that it was important to catch and fix any problems early.

John Sebes suggested that a good project for later on this year would be to review our historical costs for supporting the AS infrastructure, in order to have a predicted budget for future budgeting years. Ian said we could develop a physical plan plant – he has seen this in other churches – where an expert evaluates the physical plant, outlines what investment and maintenance will be needed in future years – then the organization can put a line item in the budget and begin accumulating funds to pay for the future expense.

Sally Cadigan observed, and the entire Vestry agreed, that the new benches that were installed

by Carol and her family were beautiful, and we are all indebted to them for their donation of the benches and their time and effort.

**Parish Life.** Diane Frankle wrote a comprehensive report.

**Fall Kickoff Event / Auction (this is under Parish Life).** Sally Cadigan gave a quick status on the Fall Kickoff Event / Fundraiser. Mary Ann Hayward and Joan Sanders have agreed to host the dinner that day. The planning group (Mary Ann, Sally, Joan, Mary) is looking for someone to coordinate the auction. The date is Sunday November 5<sup>th</sup>, with social hour at 5 pm and dinner at 6 pm.

**Administration.** Jeff Rensch asked about the status of Jeffrey Jones, the interim parish administrator. Jeffrey committed to work for AS on a part-time basis through May; Ian asked him to stay through June; he will likely continue through mid July.

**Newcomers.** Heather Hadlock and Ian Montgomery are planning to meet (possibly with additional people) and discuss next steps. Heather said she wrote up the requirements of the role for someone to be a leader for Newcomers.

Vestry decided that the Sunday after Labor Day should be Kickoff Sunday.

### **Report on Personnel Committee / Rector Review Committee**

Sally Cadigan reported that there was the first meeting of Personnel Committee. The first project for the committee is to have a six-month review with the rector. The goal is to have this review meeting with Ian some time in July.

### **Financial Report**

The Rector led a review of the newly designed financial statements. At this point in the year,

income is ahead of schedule and expenses are slightly behind.

#### **Resolution on Investments Administrator**

The Finance Committee recommended that we look at consolidating the management of our funds/accounts.

#### **Bishop's Visit**

The Bishop is visiting AS on June 25. The Vestry agreed that they would like to have a social lunch with the Bishop afterwards, either on- or offsite.

#### **Goals for the Year**

The Rector in his report had consolidated a list of priority actions for the Vestry for the rest of the year, based on all the earlier discussions that have occurred. Some vestry members pointed out that this is the Vestry's action-item list for the next 6 months – the Commissions are also doing a lot, which should not be duplicated on this list. There was a great deal of discussion, but

in the end the Vestry agreed that these office administration projects do need to take top priority for the rest of the year.

- Get the Finance Office and Reporting structure into good order.
- Get the rota and scheduling/calendaring/publicity into good order.
- Hire a curate.
- Search for and hire a Parish Administrator.
- Install new phone system and install new computer system in place.
- Hotel de Zink, foster and support.

- Get Newcomers pipeline in place.
- Diocesan relations.
- Vestry structure for 20

## Diocesan News

### **Presiding Bishop-elect Katharine Jefferts Schori is welcomed by members of the House of Deputies June 18.**

The Episcopal Church, 30 years after it allowed women to become priests and bishops, has elected a woman as its Presiding Bishop.

Katharine Jefferts Schori, 52, bishop of Nevada, was elected from a slate of seven nominees, on the fifth ballot June 18, as the 26th Presiding Bishop. She is the first woman to hold the top post in the church's nearly 400-year history. Her nine-year term officially begins November 1; she will be invested and seated November 4 during a liturgy at Washington National Cathedral.

Jefferts Schori breaks tradition in other ways. The airplane pilot and former oceanographer addressed deputies and visitors who gathered in the Columbus Convention Center in both Spanish and English. She thanked the other nominees and reassured the church of her passion for mission. She also offered a vision of reconciliation and actualization of the reign of God.

"I give deep and abiding thanks for the ministry of the current Presiding Bishop," she said after an introduction by Presiding Bishop Frank Griswold. She added that she hoped his "gifts continue to be shared within the church and the world in years to come because he has very much to give us all."

Griswold, in a statement issued later, said "The decision today is the fruit of the witness and

ministry of women bishops, priest, and deacons in the life of our church."

Enthusiastic applause, cheers and shouts of joy erupted in the House of Deputies as President George Werner read Special Order E017, the resolution asking the Deputies to approve Jefferts Schori's election. A two-thirds majority of both clergy and lay deputies then confirmed her election.

### **ENGLAND: Key debate on women bishops set for July Synod**

From Columbus: Episcopal Church elects first woman Presiding Bishop

The Church of England's General Synod, which will be held at the University of York from 4 p.m. on Friday, July 7, to lunchtime on Tuesday, July 11, has a full and demanding agenda, including debates on women bishops and a substantial amount of major legislative business.

The Synod will be explicitly invited to reach a view on whether admitting women to the episcopate in the Church of England would be theologically justified. If that motion is carried, the House of Bishops will invite the Synod to agree that a legislative drafting group be established, with a view to preparing a range of specific options that the group would submit for consideration by the House of Bishops, and then to the Synod, in advance of first consideration of the Measure.

The Archbishop of York, the Most Rev. and Rt. Hon. John Sentamu, will deliver the Presidential Address.

He is available for pastoral calls at any hour of the day or night.


He tries to take one continuous 24 hour period off each week and generally this is Monday.
